## Writing and the MLA

Keep this in your notebook!!! You will use it often. Treasure it for the wealth of information that it is!!

- 1. As part of your revision process, always **read** your essay/writing piece **out loud**. You will find strange and interesting errors this way. I promise.
- 2. Write all MLA essays in present tense.
- 3. Vary your sentence structure. It makes the piece more reader friendly, less boring, and more worthy of an A (in other words, don't begin all of your sentences in the same way).
- 4. Use **correct formatting:** Times New Roman, 12 pt. font, double spaced, one inch margins, and indent all paragraphs.
- 5. Heading single spaced on first page only: Name

- 6. Do not use contractions. Don't.
- 7. Omit slang (a lot, cause, okay), clichés (don't judge a book by its cover), and exclamation points (if writing in MLA).
- 8. Never end a sentence with a preposition (rabbit and the log in, around, on, during, etc.)
- 9. Utilize the **four Ps** of quote integration (point, preview, proof, pull together). Refer to your notes!! Every quote should fit into a sentence of your own making.
- 10. Be **clear**, **concise**, to the point. Do not waste your page limit on wordiness, repetition, vagueness, or unclear argumentation.
- 11. DO NOT use first person (I, me, my, mine, we, us) or second person (you, your yours).
- 12. Do not use the following words (I hate them. I really do.):
